Introduction

Do you know the difference is between kinetic energy and potential energy?

Kinetic energy is the energy of motion. It is the "energy contained by a form of matter because of its motion, or work that is needed to accelerate the object from rest to action." It exists whenever an object or person has motion, such as a thrown tennis ball, an icicle falling to the ground, a dog barking, or a person walking. When matter is not in motion, it contains potential energy, which is essentially the opposite of kinetic energy.

Potential energy transfers into kinetic energy when some kind of force is applied to the object to cause it to move in some way. Kinetic energy occurs when potential energy becomes unleashed; that is, when it is used, when it is exerted. In our church, we have potential energy, but it is when the Holy Spirit prompts us to action that we have kinetic energy and things begin to happen, and we begin to grow.

The problem often is not that The Holy Spirit is not prompting us into action, but that we often decline to be involved. For some strange reason, in many churches people come up with lots of different excuses for why they will not get involved.

Some people may think, "Once I grow in my love a little bit then I'll jump in there and do some kind of a ministry. I don't really love people that much right now. In fact, most people just irritate me so I better wait until God gives me some more love and then I'll help out in a ministry." Or "Once I am a little more secure as a Christian and have more knowledge and have read the Bible all the way through, I'll get involved in a ministry."

Both of those statements are so far from the truth. From the very beginning of our journey of faith we should be performing acts of ministry and service and that is how we become more loving, secure, humble and proactive. Just as a weight lifter doesn't look at the weight bar and say, "When I get stronger I'll start lifting weights." Or a runner doesn't say, "Once I get faster I'll start running.

The weight lifter lifts the weights in order to get stronger, and the runner runs races to in order to get faster. And so the truth is. If we don't stand up and get involved in service our spiritual growth will never take off.

Jesus washes his disciples' feet

- 13 It was just before the Passover Festival. Jesus knew that the hour had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end.
- ²The evening meal was in progress, and the devil had already prompted Judas, the son of Simon Iscariot, to betray Jesus. ³Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God; ⁴so he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel round his waist. ⁵After that, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped round him.
- 6He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?'
- ⁷Jesus replied, 'You do not realise now what I am doing, but later you will understand.'
- 8'No,' said Peter, 'you shall never wash my feet.'

Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no part with me.'

- 9'Then, Lord,' Simon Peter replied, 'not just my feet but my hands and my head as well!'
- ¹⁰Jesus answered, 'Those who have had a bath need only to wash their feet; their whole body is clean. And you are clean, though not every one of you.' ¹¹For he knew who was going to betray him, and that was why he said not every one was clean.
- ¹²When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. 'Do you understand what I have done for you?' he asked them. ¹³ 'You call me "Teacher" and "Lord", and rightly so, for that is what I am. ¹⁴ Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. ¹⁵ I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you. ¹⁶ Very truly I tell you, no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. ¹⁷ Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them.
